Dynamics of Family Leadership



ALEXIS BRACED HERSELF TO FACE THE HARSH CONSEQUENCES THAT WERE CERTAIN BECAUSE OF HER DISHONESTY WITH HER MOTHER. Alexis was a new student at a new school. She hoped to make friends with girls who loved to sing, just like she did, so Alexis joined the school choir. On the first day of choir practice, Alexis met

April, and the two quickly became good friends.

One day, April mentioned that she wanted to meet up with some boys across town. Alexis was willing to go with her, but neither of them could drive. Alexis had an idea. That night, Alexis took a credit card from her mother's purse and opened a rideshare account. Alexis had money saved from recent birthday cards, so she planned to pay the rideshare driver in cash—that way, the charge would not show up on her mother's credit card statement. The next day, Alexis lied to her mother and told her that she was staying late after school for choir and her friend's mother would bring her home. Alexis's mother believed her.

Alexis started thinking about how the lies that other family members had told in the past caused major problems for their family. She also knew that hanging out with boys she did not know was unwise and potentially dangerous. Even though Alexis realized her actions were wrong, the next day after school, she scheduled a rideshare, and she and several friends went to meet up with the boys as planned.

Alexis's mother was on her way home from work when she received an alert

from her credit card company about suspicious activity on her card. Around the same time, Alexis's aunt called to tell her sister that she saw Alexis riding in a car that she did not recognize with some other girls. Alexis's mother then realized that Alexis was the one responsible for the unauthorized use of her credit card.

Alexis was dishonest with her mother. What steps should Alexis take to restore her mother's trust?


WORK OUT

TODAY'S LESSON HIGHLIGHTS HOW UNGODLY DECISIONS CAN IMPACT A FAMILY. Our lesson focuses on two of Jacob's sons—Reuben and Judah. Reuben had a relationship with a woman who was already in a relationship with his father. Reuben thought that he had gotten away with this action, but someone told his father about what he did. As the oldest son, Reuben stood to receive a double portion of the family inheritance in comparison to his siblings. Now, because of his wrongful act, Reuben would lose his inheritance. His father decided to give the inheritance to someone else as a consequence of Reuben's disrespect toward him.

Tamar was Judah's daughter-in-law. She was married to two of Judah's sons—Er, and then Onan, after Er's death. It was customary for the living brother to marry the widow of his brother. After Onan died, Shelah was Judah's son who was next in line to marry Tamar. However, Judah did not follow through with the custom again because he feared Shelah would die like his brothers.

Sometime later, Judah had an inappropriate relationship with a woman in Enaim (see Genesis 38). That woman was Tamar, but she disguised herself so that Judah would not know it was her. Tamar became pregnant by Judah. Judah then admitted that he had dealt with Tamar unjustly. She bore no wrongdoing for what she did in response. Both Reuben and Judah committed a sexual sin, but Judah took responsibility for his sin. Because of his sincere regret for his wrongdoing, God used Judah to fulfill a prominent role in history.
